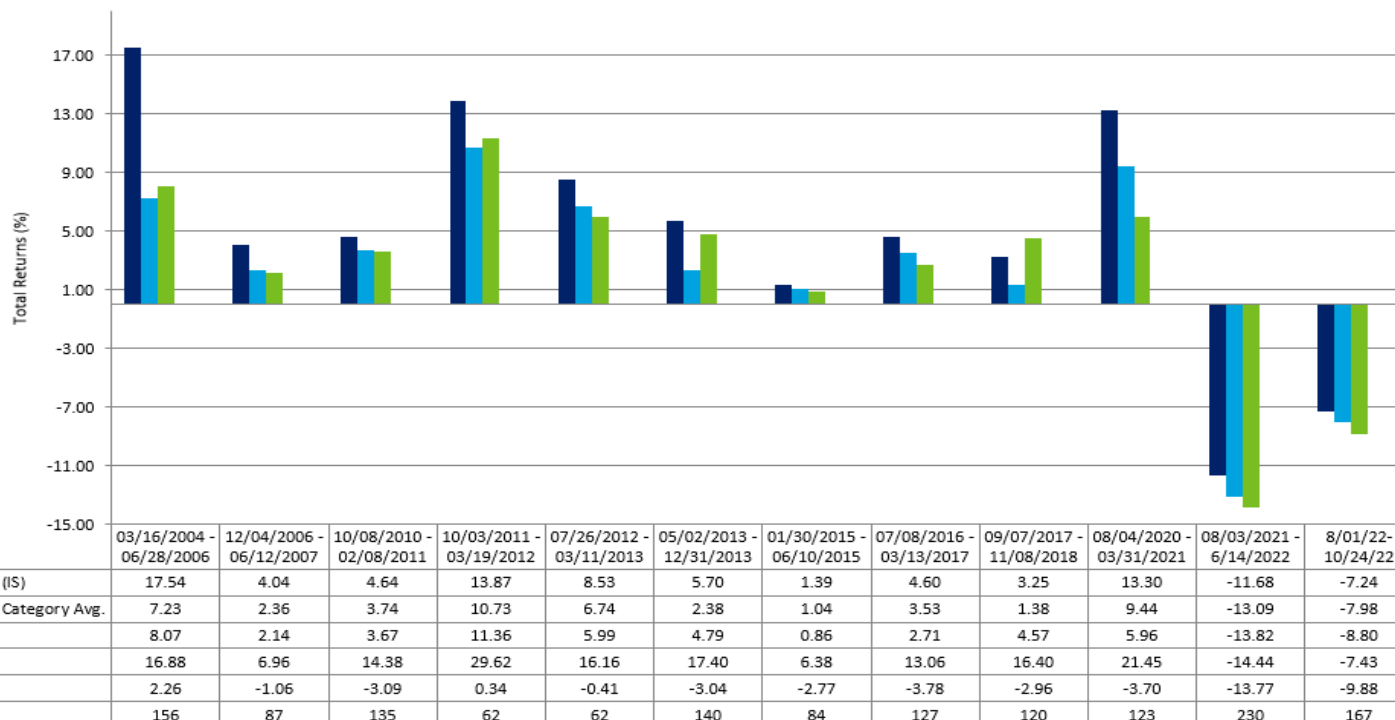


A Core Portfolio Option that may be Well-Positioned for Rising Rates and Volatility

Federated Hermes Capital Income Fund seeks to provide “intelligent income” - a balanced approach to monthly income, total return, and risk through a diversified portfolio of dividend paying equity and higher yielding fixed income securities. This combination has resulted in **outperformance during periods of rising rates and a history of lower downside risk during periods of market volatility**. This is in addition to pursuing a **relatively high monthly income stream**.

Outperformance In Rising Rate Environments

When the 10-year Treasury increased by more than 50 bps – the Fund outperformed its Morningstar 30-50% Equity category in all time periods and a blend of broad-based fixed income and equity indices, in all but one time-period.

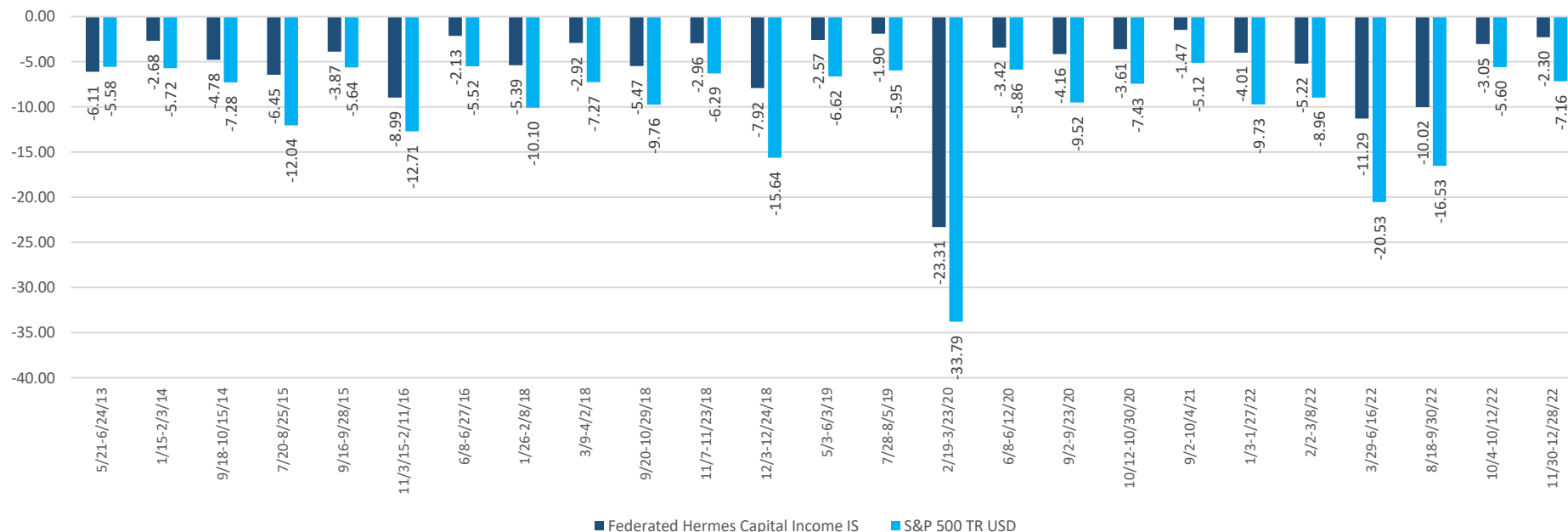

History of Lower Downside Risk

The Fund has consistently delivered lower downside than the overall market during periods when the S&P 500 has declined by 5% or more over the past 10 years. The average returns of these drawdown periods are -5.44% for Federated Hermes Capital Income Fund vs. -9.85% for the S&P 500.

30-day yield (also known as "SEC yield") is a compounded and annualized figure calculated according to a formula set by the SEC. The formula requires use of a specific methodology for calculating dividends and interest earned, and expenses accrued, during the period, and reflects the maximum offering price per fund share. The standardized computation is designed to facilitate yield comparisons among different funds. In the absence of temporary expense waivers or reimbursements, the 30-day yield for IS shares would have been 3.22% and the 30-day yield for the A shares would have been 2.97% at NAV and 2.80% at MOP.

The fund's Institutional Shares commenced operations on March 30, 2012. For the period prior to the commencement of operations of the Institutional Shares, the performance information shown is for the fund's A Shares. The performance of the A Shares has not been adjusted to reflect the expenses of the Institutional Shares, since the Institutional

Shares had a lower expense ratio than the expense ratio of the A Shares. The performance of the A Shares has been adjusted to reflect the absence of sales charges and adjusted to remove any voluntary waiver of fund expenses related to the A Shares during the period prior to the commencement of operations of the Institutional Shares.

Definitions

S&P 500 Index is an unmanaged capitalization-weighted index of 500 stocks designated to measure performance of the broad domestic economy through changes in the aggregate market value of 500 stocks representing all major industries.

Bloomberg US Aggregate Bond Index is an unmanaged index composed of securities from the Bloomberg Government/Corporate Bond Index, the Mortgage-Backed Securities Index and the Asset-Backed Securities Index.
