Fund Description

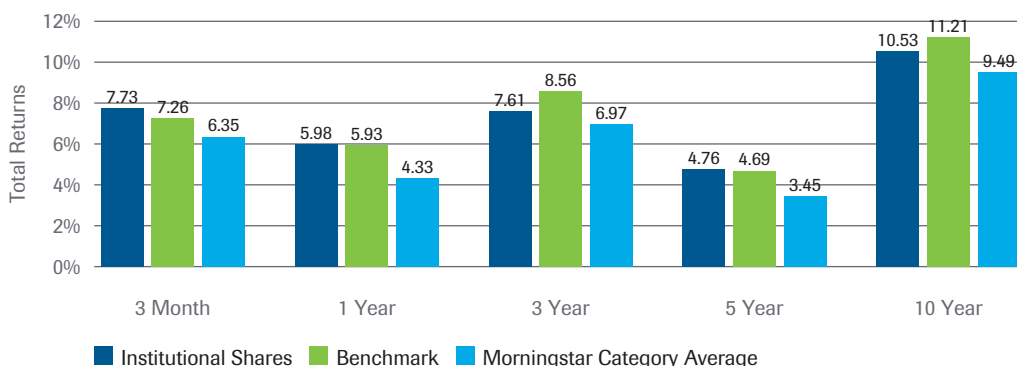
The fund pursues a high level of current income by investing primarily in non-investment-grade corporate fixed-income securities issued by U.S. or foreign businesses. Such securities tend to perform at their best during economic recoveries and expansions, and can offer portfolio diversification as their performance historically is uncorrelated to other types of bonds.

Consistency of Process

- A bottom-up process, focusing on strong operating companies that generate free cash flow in stable and predictable businesses.
- We hold a fundamentally different view of quality compared to the rating agencies. Our process includes: focus on franchise value, industry profile, competitive profile, strength of management, forward-looking view of company financials and a belief that the market is more efficient at pricing high-yield credit risk than the agencies.

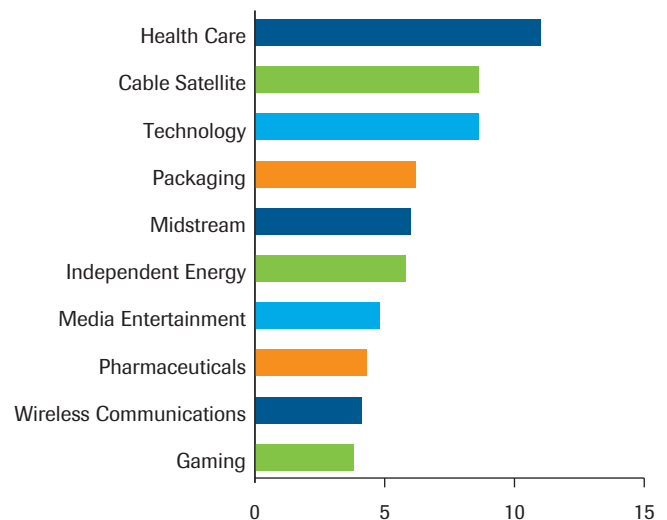

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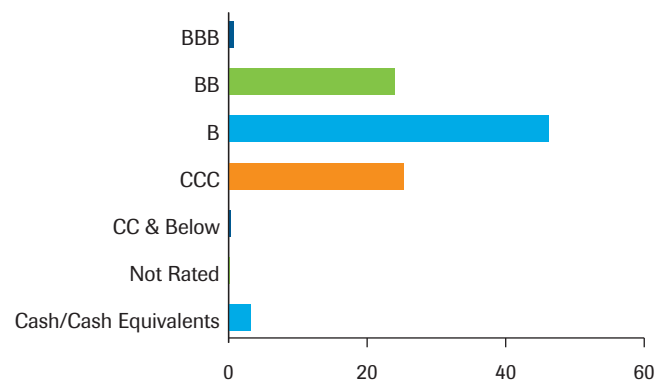

Market Overview

For the three months ended March 31, 2019, the high-yield market substantially outperformed the investment-grade bond market. For example, the Bloomberg Barclays U.S. Corporate High Yield 2% Issuer Capped Bond Index (BBC2%HYBI) returned 7.26% versus a 2.94% return for the Bloomberg Barclays Aggregate Bond Index (Aggregate), a measure of high-quality bond performance.

The high-yield market's performance for the quarter was greatly aided by the attractive valuations that existed at the beginning of the period after a particularly rough fourth quarter of 2018. Much of the market weakness that occurred in the fourth quarter quickly reversed as 2019 began as did the underlying causes of the late 2018 weakness. For example, oil prices, which fell over 30% in 2018's fourth quarter, rebounded almost 30%, the government shutdown ended and perhaps most importantly concerns over the Federal Reserve's (Fed's) interest rate policy were alleviated. The Fed turned much more dovish at its March meeting triggering a move lower in interest rates across the U.S. Treasury curve. The equity market also saw a major reversal with most indices ending the quarter up double digits. While concerns persisted over unresolved trade issues, Brexit, and Chinese and eurozone economic weakness, the high-yield market chose to focus on good corporate earnings, low default rates and solid U.S. economic conditions. This is illustrated by the movement of the yield spread between the Credit Suisse High Yield Bond Index and Treasury securities with comparable maturities, which bottomed in early October at 353 basis points, ended 2018 at 575 basis points and declined to 449 basis points as of March 31, 2019.

Within the high-yield market, the strongest-performing major industries relative to the BBC2%HYBI were: Oil Field Services, Pharmaceuticals, Finance Companies, Construction Machinery and Retailers. The worst-performing major industries relative to the BBC2%HYBI were: Automotive, Media & Entertainment, Wireless Telecommunications, Chemicals and Diversified Manufacturing. Returns across quality sectors were fairly equal with the more interest rate sensitive BB-rated sector and the B-rated sector both having a total return of 7.21%, followed closely by the CCC-rated sector with returns of 7.15%.

Performance

The fund (IS) outperformed the BBC2%HYBI during the quarter as a result of strong security selection. This was especially true in the Packaging, Independent Energy, Health Care, Cable & Satellite, Finance Companies and Metals & Mining industry sectors. The fund was also positively impacted by strong security selection and an overweight to the strong-performing Pharmaceutical sector. Specific high-yield issuers held by the portfolio that positively impacted performance relative to the BBC2%HYBI included: Bausch Health Companies, Navient, Mallinckrodt, Inception Merger and Altice Luxembourg.

The fund was negatively impacted by an underweight to the strong-performing Oil Field Service sector. Specific high-yield issuers held by the portfolio that negatively impacted performance relative to the BBC2%HYBI included: Team Health, Adient, Air Medical Group, Endo Pharmaceutical and Ultra Resources. The fund's total return for the period also reflected actual cash flows, transaction costs and other expenses that were not reflected in the total return of the BBC2%HYBI.

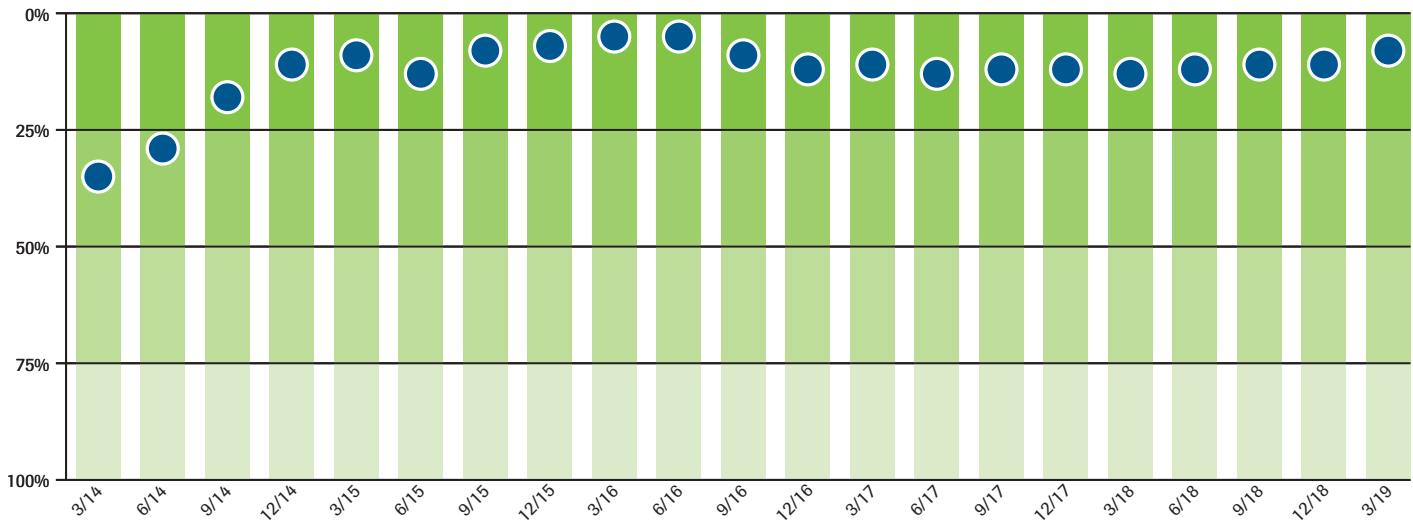
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How We Are Positioned

High-yield spreads retraced roughly half the fourth quarter widening in the March quarter leaving yield spreads well above the October 2018 lows but still inside the long-term median levels in the low 500's. We expect spreads to continue to grind tighter on the strength of the solid U.S. economy powered by the extremely strong employment environment and the newly dovish Fed. While we are keeping an eye on the quality of new issuers in the high-yield market, current issuer financial metrics remain reasonable, which should keep default rates below historical levels. While high-yield relative returns should be attractive in this scenario, absolute returns will need to be viewed in the context of the 7%+ benchmark returns to date. The main risks continue to be trade policy and economic weakness in the eurozone and China.

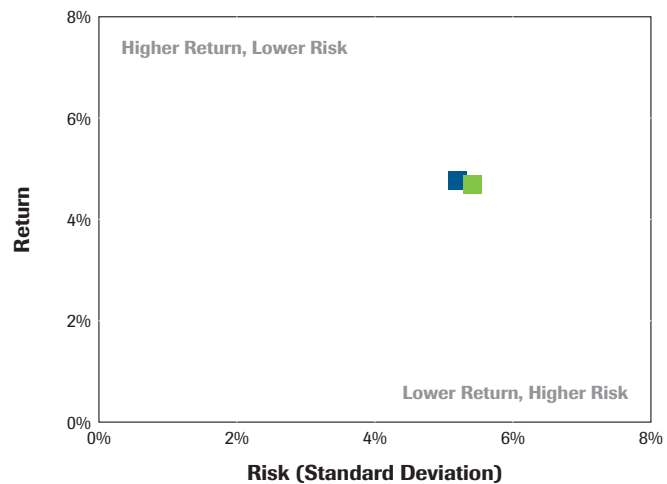

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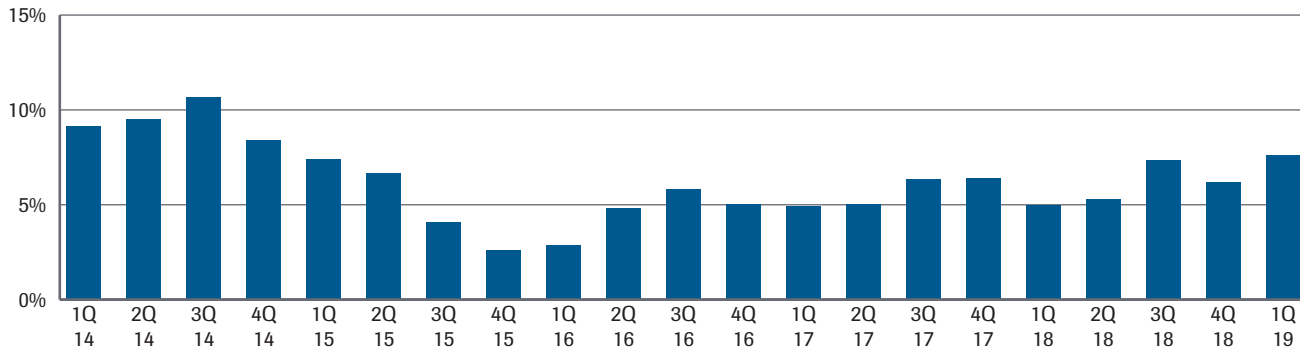
5-Year Risk/Return

¹The ratings agencies that provided the ratings are Standard & Poor's, Moody's and Fitch. When ratings vary, the highest rating is used. Credit ratings of A or better are considered to be high credit quality; credit ratings of BBB are good credit quality and the lowest category of investment grade; credit ratings BB and below are lower-rated securities ("junk bonds"); and credit ratings of CCC or below have high default risk. The credit quality breakdown does not give effect to the impact of any credit derivative investments made by the fund.

The 30-day yield (also known as "SEC yield") is a compounded and annualized figure calculated according to a formula set by the SEC. The formula requires use of a specific methodology for calculating dividends and interest earned, and expenses accrued, during the period, and reflects the maximum offering price per fund share. The standardized computation is designed to facilitate yield comparisons among different funds. In the absence of temporary expense waivers or reimbursements, the 30-day yield would have been 5.87% for R6 Shares and 5.83% for Institutional Shares.

The fund's R6 Shares commenced operations on June 30, 2016. For the period prior to the commencement of operations of the R6 Shares, the performance information shown is for Institutional Shares. The performance of the Institutional Shares has not been adjusted to reflect the expenses applicable to the R6 Shares since the R6 Shares have a lower expense ratio than the expense ratio of the Institutional Shares. The performance of the Institutional Shares has been adjusted to remove any voluntary waiver of fund expenses related to the Institutional Shares that may have occurred during the period prior to the commencement of operations of the R6 Shares.

Definitions

Bloomberg Barclays U.S. Aggregate Bond Index is an unmanaged index composed of securities from the Bloomberg Barclays Government/Corporate Bond Index, the Mortgage-Backed Securities Index and the Asset-Backed Securities Index. Total return comprises price appreciation/depreciation and income as a percentage of the original investment. Indices are rebalanced monthly by market capitalization.

Bloomberg Barclays U.S. Corporate High Yield 2% Issuer Capped Index is an issuer-constrained version of the flagship U.S. Corporate High Yield Index, which measures the USD-denominated, high yield, fixed-rate corporate bond market. The index follows the same rules as the uncapped version, but limits the exposure of each issuer to 2% of the total market value and redistributes any excess market value index wide on a pro rata basis. The index was created in 2002, with history backfilled to January 1, 1993.

Indexes are unmanaged and cannot be invested in directly.

Alpha shows how much or how little return is generated, given the risk a portfolio takes. A portfolio with an Alpha greater than 0 has earned more than expected given its Beta—meaning the portfolio has generated excess return without increasing risk. A portfolio with a negative Alpha is producing a lower return than would be expected given its risk.

Beta measures a portfolio's volatility relative to the market. A Beta greater than 1.00 suggests the portfolio has historically been more volatile than the market as measured by the fund's benchmark. A Beta less than 1.00 suggests the portfolio has historically had less volatility relative to the market.

Sharpe Ratio is calculated by dividing a fund's annualized excess return by the fund's annualized standard deviation. The higher the Sharpe Ratio, the better the fund's historical risk adjusted performance.

Standard Deviation is a historical measure of the variability of returns relative to the average annual return. A higher number indicates higher overall volatility.

Up Capture Ratio/Down Capture Ratio is a measure of how well a manager was able to replicate or improve on periods of positive benchmark returns, and how badly the manager was affected by periods of negative benchmark returns. The up-market capture ratio is a measure of a manager's performance in up markets relative to the index during the same period. For

example, a ratio value of 115 indicates that the manager has outperformed the market index by 15% in periods when the index has risen. The down-market capture ratio is the direct opposite of the up-market capture ratio, gauging performance of the manager relative to the index in down markets. A ratio value of 80 would indicate the manager had declined on 80% as much as the declining overall market, indicating relative outperformance.

Weighted Average Bond Price is the weighted average of all individual bond prices within a portfolio.

Weighted Average Coupon is the weighted average interest payment of all individual debt securities within a portfolio.

Weighted Average Duration to Worst is the approximate percentage change in a bond's price given a 1% change in its yield-to-maturity or its yield-to-call, whichever is lower. Duration-to-Worst is the same as Macaulay's duration except the pre-determined set of principal and interest cash flows are based on either the final maturity date, or a call date within the bond's call schedule, whichever would result in the lowest yield to the investor – i.e., the Yield-to-Worst.

Weighted Average Effective Maturity is the average time to maturity of debt securities held in the fund.

Weighted Average Yield to Worst is an average of the lowest potential yield that can be received on a bond without the issuer actually defaulting. The yield to worst is calculated by making worst-case scenario assumptions on the issue by calculating the returns that would be received if provisions, including prepayment, call or sinking fund, are used by the issuer.

Ratings and Rating Agencies

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This must be preceded or accompanied by a prospectus.
